All rising seniors must read BOTH books! There will be a written response test within the first few days of the school year. The test will evaluate basic comprehension and understanding of key thematic ideas.

Klara and the Sun by Kazuo Ishiguro (2021)

A luminous new novel from the Nobel Prize-winning author of *Never Let Me Go* and *The Remains of the Day, Klara and the Sun* explores the uncharted implications of AI to human relationships and the abiding question of what it means to love.

The novel tells the story of Klara, an Artificial Friend with outstanding observational qualities, who, from her place in the store, watches carefully the behavior of those who come in to browse, and of those who pass in the street outside. She remains hopeful a customer will soon choose her, but when the possibility emerges that her circumstances may change for ever, Klara is warned not to invest too much in the promises of humans.

Siddhartha by Hermann Hesse (1922)

Herman Hesse's classic novel has delighted, inspired, and influenced generations of readers, writers, and thinkers. Into the Wild by John Krakauer

Here the adventures and misadventures of the Norse gods and goddesses function as short stories that, together, build an arc that leads the reader onward to Ragnarök, the twilight of the gods. Giants, ogres, dwarves, fantastical beasts, and the occasional human freely mingle with Thor, Odin, Loki, Freya, and other, less well-known gods and goddesses, all of whom are passionate, flawed, weird, and divinely entertaining.

Hatchet is the story of Brian Robeson, a thirteen-year-old boy from suburban New York City. His parents have recently split, and Brian is spending the summer with his father in northern Canada. When the pilot of the single-engine plane that flies Brian over the Canadian wilderness has a fatal heart attack, Brian manages to crash-land the plane in a small lake. Thrown into a wild and harsh environment, he must learn to survive by trial and error as he constructs a shelter, finds food, creates fire, skirmishes with wildlife and weather, and steadily develops confidence and resilience.. Throughout his ordeal, Brian's only tool is the hatchet his mother gave him just before his ill-fated flight. It proves invaluable as Brain learns how best to use it.

A Wrinkle in Time by Madeline L'Engle

First published in 1962, Madeleine L'Engle's A Wrinkle in Time is one of the forerunners of the contemporary young adult science fantasy novel, paving the way for the Harry Potters and Katniss Everdeens of the literary world. It received numerous accolades, including a Newbery Medal and the Lewis Carroll Shelf Award, and was also a runner-up for the prestigious Hans Christian Andersen Award. In spite of the novel's eventual impact, L'Engle's A Wrinkle in Time was rejected by dozens of publishing houses at first. One theory is that publishers at the time were reluctant to put out a science fantasy novel featuring a young girl as its heroine.
