Despite his terrible hardships, Mr. Schonwetter remains optimistic.

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ACADEMIC UPDATES

<u>PROGRESS REPORTS</u> – for the fourth quarter will be emailed over the weekend. It can be particularly challenging to stay focused at this time of year with the weather getting warmer and spring activities picking up. Please help your children to continue working through the end of the school year. Encourage them to put forth the effort that is needed. If students let up in their efforts, the good grades at progress report time may not necessarily equate to good grades at

the quarter or semester – and vice versa! <u>Also, keep in mind that second semester grades directly impact a student's</u> <u>athletic eligibility for fall and winter sports, i.e., an unweighted second semester 2.0 is required.</u>

SECOND SEMESTER EXAM SCHEDULE – Students will be taking their exams in one month! Exams are an important learning experience for students, and they will need to prepare diligently. <u>All classes have exams and exams must be taken at the scheduled times</u>. Students who miss semester exams for reasons other than illness (who will be given the opportunity to make up the exams) will receive an F for those examinations. Just a reminder regarding the **seniors- only exam exemption policy**: Seniors may be exempt from second semester exams if: 1) the course is a two-semester course; 2) the teacher chooses to allow exam exemptions; 3) third and fourth quarter grades average to at least a 93%; and 4) fine arts requirements must have been completed by Friday, March 17, and community service requirements by Friday, May 5, 2023. Students enrolled in AP courses must take the AP exam AND teacher-developed final exams. Seniors in non-AP classes who choose to take AP exams will also take teacher-developed final exams unless they meet the exemption standards. Non-seniors who choose to take an AP exam for an AP class in which they are not enrolled must take the final exam for their class.

<u>SCHEDULING CLASSES</u> – The scheduling process for the upcoming school year is underway. Course request forms were sent home with all students last Tuesday, April 18. They are due back to the office on Monday, May 1. Because of the scope of the task, schedules won't be complete until registration in August. The process involves analyzing students' and parents' requests in addition to other pieces of the puzzle: standardized test scores; grades; teacher recommendations including information about each student's work ethic; class offerings; and so on. Significant time is spent in efforts to place students in appropriate courses. If a student needs a tutor in any class or does not enjoy a particular subject, aspiring to Advanced Placement or advanced honors courses is a misplaced concentration of effort. Success in advanced honors/Advanced Placement courses in any subject is predicated

on the understanding that the students in these classes enjoy the subject matter, enjoy putting forth the extra effort needed in these classes, and have a natural affinity for these courses. All CCHS courses are taught at the college preparatory level <u>at the very least</u>. Encourage your children to do <u>their</u> best, using every ounce of their God-given abilities. It is far better for a student to be successful, productive, and happy in honors and college preparatory courses than to struggle unhappily and with modest success in advanced honors or Advanced Placement courses.

2023-24 TUITION, CALENDAR, AND TEXTBOOK INFORMATION

NEW STUDENTS - 2023-2024-- The Admissions Committee is in the midst of the admissions cycle for the 2023-24 school year. NOTE – It is rare for CCHS to accept students as juniors and seniors. Only juniors and seniors moving into the area will be considered.

TUITION INFORMATION FOR 2023-24 — including invoices, payment options, and loan information from was mailed on April 21. This year's tuition invoice includes the general and class fees as well. **Tuition payment in full is due June 15** (late charge assessed at \$1.00 per day after June 15) and **fee payment is due by the August registration date** (students will not be allowed to pick up their schedules until registration fees are paid). IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING DIOCESAN TUITION ASSISTANCE— For the thirty-second consecutive year, the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will continue its tradition of offering the Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) in an effort to keep Catholic school education affordable for families who desire it but who may need some financial assistance to make that dream a reality. Thanks to Most Reverend Mark Brennan's commitment to Catholic education, funds have once again been allocated for distribution to families in need of assistance. This year, Phase 1 will be open to Catholic families only, but Phase 2 will be open to Catholic and non-Catholic families. Awards are based on a family's degree of need relative to all other applicants. Apply on-line at www.factsmgt.com. Click on "Grant and Aid Assessment" and log in. Have your 2022 tax information available. Catholic families with children currently enrolled or who are applying to enroll for the 2023-2024 school year should apply ASAP. Applications opened February 1. The deadline for Phase 1 is April 30, 2023; the Phase 2 deadline is July 31, 2023. PLEASE NOTE THE CHANGE TO THE PHASE 2 DEADLINE. IT HAS BEEN MOVED UP ONE MONTH! No assistance will be available from the Diocese or from any school unless an application and all required documentation is submitted, and the fee has been paid by the deadline. The application fee is \$35. The Diocese will pay \$17.50 and families must pay \$17.50.

TEXTBOOK PROCEDURES 2023-2024

Please note that **foreign language** textbooks for all grades are new this year. Most of the newly adopted textbooks have a very recent copyright date; therefore, used supplies on the internet are extremely limited. You are encouraged to take advantage of CCHS book forms in June in order to have textbooks available for the start of school. All students will receive a book order form at school and forms will be available on the school website.

Middle School

Middle school students will receive order forms for required textbooks in English class in May. These forms must be completed by parents and returned to school by noon on June 2. Textbooks ordered in June should be available for pick up during registration in August. **Parents may order these books on their own if they so choose; please refer to the correct ISBN number on the textbook order form.**

<u>Please note that the Theology consumable textbook used in middle school is included in your fees.</u> Math textbooks for 7th grade will be ordered at registration once placement is known. A textbook fee for middle school foreign language will be assessed during August registration and all middle school foreign language materials will be provided by the teacher.

High School

An order form for textbooks for core classes will be given to students in English class and is due back in the office by noon on June 2. Textbooks ordered in June should be available for pickup at registration in August. **Parents may order these books on their own if they so choose; please refer to the correct ISBN number on the textbook order form.**

Electives and some placed courses must wait until August registration for schedules to be finalized.

Core Classes: English 9 Honors, Theology 9, Health, Physical Science Honors & Advanced Honors, English 10 Honors & Advanced Honors, Theology 10, Physical Education, English 11 Honors, English 11 AP, Theology 11, US History 20/21st Honors, English 12 Honors & AP, Theology 12

Geometry and Algebra 2 use the same book across all classes and these can be ordered in June.

Electives and Placement classes

High school students will order books for electives and placement classes once their schedule is known at August registration. Parents may order these books on their own if they so choose; please refer to the correct ISBN number on the textbook order form which will be provided in August.

AP Courses & Higher Level Math (Calculus AB, Calculus BC, PreCalc II/Calc A, Trig/Precalc, Math Functions, Economics, Human Geography, US Government, World History, US History, European History, Biology, Physics, Psychology, and Art History)

There is a **mandatory rental policy** for high school students in AP classes and higher level math. Students will rent their textbooks from the school, with a rental fee included in AP or class fees. All AP/Higher Level Math textbooks **must** come from the school.



English Novels

Parents may refer to a list that will be provided by the teacher next year for information about novels to be used in English classes during the school year and should order the novels required on their own. **CCHS will not order novels.** Please pay special attention to the details of the novels to be used when ordering (ISBN, printing number, edition, etc.). In some cases, these lists may not be complete and may be added to throughout the school year. Ample notification will be given in these cases.

NOTES FROM THE ACADEMIC ADVISOR

1.) The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources requires that all schools keep students' immunization records up to date. All 7th and 12th grade students enrolled in WV public and private schools must have proof of immunizations or they will not be allowed to begin school in August. Students entering 7th and 12th grades must have 1 dose of the Tdap vaccine and 1 dose of the meningitis vaccine. If the 12th grade student received a meningitis vaccine before his/her 16th birthday, he/she is required to have a second dose of the vaccine at this time. CCHS must have an updated copy of the immunization records, which include these vaccines, on file in the school office in order to allow your child to begin school in August 2023. If your student

has had vaccinations in the past year, please send a copy of the new health record to CCHS Attn: Mrs. McLaughlin.

- 2.) SAT and ACT testing and registration information and registration is available online at -www.collegeboard.org and www.act.org (CCHS code: 490-205). CCHS encourages students to take both the ACT and the SAT before the end of their junior year. Doing this allows students to get a baseline score and to prepare for future tests. Both tests are accepted by colleges and universities for admission.
- 3.) Students who miss more than 5 unexcused class periods are required to make up time at the end of the semester. Mr. Villers will notify students who need to make up class time for excessive absences. Hours to be made up will be scheduled on exam days after dismissal time. Remember, only school-related activities (e.g., academic competitions, college visits, and early dismissal for school athletic events) are excused. Attendance at dance workshops/performances, family trips, non-school-related athletic events, etc. are NOT excused for attendance purposes and must be made up in order to receive Carnegie credits for classes.

HANDBOOOK REMINDERS

<u>PROOF OF ENROLLMENT FORMS</u>-- In order to secure drivers' licenses and permits, students are required to provide proof of school enrollment. These state-mandated forms are available in the school office. Students must request these forms from the school secretary **at least two days in advance. Forms are not issued during summer months.**

SEMESTER EXAMINATIONS--Semester examinations will be given in all classes. Examinations will last approximately one hour and thirty minutes for grades 9 through 12. Each middle school exam will be one hour long. Students who miss semester examinations will receive an "F" for those examinations. Students who are ill during exams will be given the opportunity to take them within a specified time period.

Exam exemption policy: All students, grades 6-12 will take first semester exams. All students grades 6-11 will take second semester exams.

Seniors only may be exempt from second semester exams if:

- the course is a two-semester course;
- the teacher chooses to allow exam exemptions;
- the student has a minimum 93% average when the third and fourth quarters are averaged together with both quarters having equal weight;
- the fine arts and community service requirements are complete by the designated deadlines.
- Excessive absences or tardies may jeopardize exam exemptions.

Students enrolled in AP courses must take the AP exam and must take teacher- developed final exams. Seniors who meet exam exemption requirements for their AP classes may be exempt from teacher- developed final exams. Seniors in non-AP classes who choose to take AP exams will also take teacher-developed final exams unless they meet the exemption standards.

Seniors must be informed of their exemption status on or before the last full day of classes. There are no exceptions to the exam exemption policy.

SPORTS UPDATE-

<u>COMMUNITY SERVICE AND FINE ARTS/HUMANITIES REQUIREMENTS</u> -- Remember, community service and fine arts activity forms must be submitted during the quarter in which the service was performed in order to receive credit. Students who fail to meet their requirements during the school year must complete double the number of hours/events over the summer in order to re-enroll at CCHS. Students should check with their theology teacher for questions about service hours and their English teacher for fine arts questions.

<u>VIRTUS</u> – Be sure you're able to help! All parents or other adults who volunteer, coach, drive students, chaperone, etc., are required by the Diocese to complete the diocesan sexual abuse awareness training before being allowed to work with our students. Training is available online or at sessions periodically scheduled. To begin, visit the VirtusOnline.org and choose the online option. Allow 1- 1¹/₂ hours to complete the program.

There will be a new process for the remaining two components of compliance. They will be completed using digital forms through the Virtus system (virtus.org). A background check and sign off on the Form Policy Relating to Sexual Abuse of Children MUST be completed online before you are able to volunteer. You must add Charleston Catholic as a location where you will be volunteering. If you have forgotten your password, or your user name, you can also call the Virtus help desk at 1-888-847-8870.

Additionally, adults who volunteer, coach, or chaperone, may be asked to update background and policy forms. Background checks must be updated every three years. Policy questionnaires should be updated if they were signed before 2014. Current Diocese guidelines do not require volunteers to update the training portion of VIRTUS. Please contact Mr. Villers with any questions about how to update your forms.
