**<u>CONDOLENCES</u>**– We express our sympathy to our students and their families who have lost loved ones recently. May the souls of the departed rest in peace: Jack Harwood's maternal grandfather; Talon Carpenter's paternal grandmother. Please keep these families in your thoughts and prayers.

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<u>FIRST SEMESTER REPORT CARDS</u> – were mailed today. For seventh through twelfth graders, semester grades are composed of first quarter grades, second quarter grades, and exam grades. Sixth graders' semester grades are composed of first and second quarter grades. Their exams are a part of their second quarter grades. When you examine your child's current report card, please note that **quarter GPAs** are reported at the bottom of each quarter's column. The semester GPA, calculated using current semester grades, is located at the bottom of the semester average column and is recorded on a student's transcript. As it appears on the high school report card, the GPA is weighted. However, the unweighted semester GPA is used for extracurricular eligibility determination (a 2.0 is required). The cumulative GPA (noted on high school report cards only), reported at the lower right under the teacher comments, is the cumulative grade point average for all high school semesters. Please note each of these details.

<u>**TRANSCRIPTS AND REPORT CARDS</u>** – At the end of the semester, there is a lot of talk about grades being recorded on a transcript. Transcripts are what colleges see, so it is important for you to know what is included. In addition to demographic information (e.g., address, phone, birthdate, etc.), academic and attendance information is recorded. CCHS **does not** include students' Social Security numbers on transcripts. Students' courses are listed by grade level and **semester grades** for each course are included with **a letter grade and a number grade**. <u>Quarter, exam, and conduct grades are NOT included on the transcript</u>. Only high school courses (not middle school records) are recorded on the transcript that will be sent to colleges during a student's senior year.</u>

**PROMOTION POLICY** – A review of the CCHS promotion policy is in order, now that first semester grades are official.

- 1.) All students (grades 6-12) must pass both semesters of <u>theology</u> in order to be promoted to the next grade level in June.
- 2.) The required number of community service hours and fine arts/humanities credits must also be completed before being granted a diploma or before being readmitted for the next school year.
- 3.) Promotion to the next grade is granted when a student earns credit for each semester's courses.
- 4.) Students who fail courses must enroll in CCHS-approved summer school programs during the summer following the failure to make up the credit if they wish to remain at CCHS. Students failing more than two semesters in one school year may be placed on academic probation or may not be readmitted to CCHS for the following school year.
- 5.) In 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students must earn a total of 7 credits each year. To be classified as a sophomore, a student must have earned 7 credits, 14 credits to be considered a junior, and 21 credits a senior.

<u>MAP TESTING</u>—Winter MAP testing begins this week for sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students. Ninth and tenth graders will take their winter MAP tests next week. These results (which will be available later this winter) will allow you to see your child's growth during this school year. All sixth through tenth graders will test again in late April/ early May. MAP scores will be used in course placements for the upcoming school year, so it is important that students do their best on this testing.

#### **RENWEB REMINDERS**

**<u>RENWEB BEST PRACTICES</u>**—As we begin the second semester, students have the opportunity to make a fresh start with their grades in all of their courses. Reviewing your child's grades and having a healthy knowledge of and discussion about students' grades can help support your child in his/her academic pursuits. However, sometimes this knowledge can translate to additional stress on students. Below please find some ideas that might help Ren Web be a beneficial experience for your family.

#### 1. Monitor grades weekly. Facilitate discussion.

By checking in weekly with Ren Web, parents are able to get the big picture of their child's week at school. Talk about what you see together. What did you learn this week? What did you do well? What did you find challenging? Were your study habits for the week successful? Do your study habits need to be adjusted for the upcoming week? Look for areas of strength and weakness. Remember, frequent monitoring of Ren Web can place a large amount of unnecessary stress on students. A weekly review gives a better picture that frequent, daily monitoring.

2. Empower your child.

If your child has a question about a grade or a misunderstood concept, encourage him or her to talk to the teacher first. It is important that our children know we support them as they take control of their own learning.

**3.** Set a time to review grades that works for your family. While Ren Web grade updates go out at midnight, grade review doesn't have to be the way your family begins Sunday morning. What makes sense for your family? When do you plan for the upcoming week? Can weekly Ren Web grade review, as well as Ren Web Lesson Plan review, fit naturally into this planning time?



## **CALENDAR AND TUITION INFORMATION FOR 2024-25**

<u>TUITION RATES FOR 2024-25</u>— Careful and thoughtful budgeting and financial planning continue at CCHS. Our costs continue to rise and efforts have been made to balance those costs with consideration of costs faced by families. The coming school year will require us to be deliberate in our spending and in our budgeting. CCHS runs solely on the income generated each year from tuition and fees. To operate in a fiscally responsible manner next year, tuition increases will be required and are being determined. An increase between 5-8% is anticipated. We have a number of financial aid opportunities available for families who need them. If you have concerns about tuition once it is released, please contact Mrs. Shindle or Mrs. Hoyer to talk about opportunities that are available. Tuition rates will be released in mid-April and invoices will be mailed at that time.

**EXCITING NEWS REGARDING DIOCESAN TUITION ASSISTANCE**— For the thirty-third consecutive year, the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston will continue its tradition of offering the Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) in an effort to keep Catholic school education affordable for families who desire it but who may need some financial assistance to make that dream a reality. Thanks to Most Reverend Mark Brennan's commitment to Catholic education, funds have once again been allocated for distribution to families in need of assistance. This year, Phase 1 will be open to Catholic families only, but Phases 2 and 3 will be open to Catholic and non-Catholic families!! A flier is attached to this email with details. Awards are based upon a family's degree of need relative to all other applicants. Apply on-line at www.factsmgt.com. Click on "Grant and Aid Assessment" and log in. Have your 2023 tax information available. Catholic families with children currently enrolled or who are applying to enroll for the 2024-2025 school year should apply ASAP. Applications open February 1. Phase 1 families must belong to a parish included on the drop-down list as part of the on-line application. The deadline for Phase 1 is April 30, 2024; the Phase 2 deadline is July 14, 2024, and; the Phase 3 deadline is August 23, 2024. No assistance will be available from the Diocese or from any school unless an application and all required documentation is submitted, and the fee has been paid by the deadline. The application fee to families is \$25. Families should only submit one application per year, not one per phase!

## FROM THE SCHOOL OFFICE

<u>VIRTUS</u> – Be sure you're able to help! All parents or other adults who volunteer, coach, drive students, chaperone, etc., are required by the Diocese to complete the diocesan sexual abuse awareness training before being allowed to work with our students. Training is available online or at sessions periodically scheduled. To begin, visit the VirtusOnline.org and choose the "First Time Registrant" option. Allow 1- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours to complete the program.

The remaining two components of compliance will be completed using digital forms through the Virtus system (<u>virtus.org</u>). A background check and sign off on the Form Policy Relating to Sexual Abuse of Children MUST be completed online before you are able to volunteer. You must add Charleston Catholic as a location where you will be volunteering.

Additionally, adults who volunteer, coach, or chaperone, may be asked to update background and policy forms. Background checks must be updated every three years. Policy questionnaires should be updated if they were signed before 2014. Current Diocese guidelines do not require volunteers to update the training portion of VIRTUS. Please contact Mr. Villers with any questions about how to update your forms.

#### HANDBOOOK REMINDERS

**PLANNED ABSENCES**.- While the school does not encourage students to miss school for any reason, there is a procedure to follow when students know of absence(s) in advance. The purpose is to notify school personnel of a student's planned absence. School-sponsored activities are excused (e.g., academic competitions, post-season sports play). All other absences are unexcused (e.g., doctor appointments, performances, funerals). It is the student's responsibility to make up all class work, assignments, and tests missed due to the absence, according to school guidelines. Students must obtain an "Out of School Notification" form from the office for all planned absences.

1. Parent/Guardian must complete the form and indicate specific date(s) and reason(s) for the absence.

2. Student must present the form to teachers and obtain signatures indicating that the teachers are aware of the absence.

3. The form must be turned into the office. Official school records will reflect the status of the absence, i.e., excused for school-approved activities or unapproved for all other absences. If a school-sponsored excused form is not completed and turned into the office prior to the absence, it will be treated as an unexcused absence.

<u>PROOF OF ENROLLMENT FORMS -</u> In order to secure drivers' licenses and permits, students are required to provide proof of school enrollment. These state-mandated forms are available in the school office. Students must request these forms from the school secretary **at least two days in advance. Forms are not issued during July.**

**STUDENT-PARENT ATHLETIC COMPACT**- Parents of student-athletes play an important role in helping their children learn how to participate in athletics appropriately. <u>ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY</u> – In order for students to be eligible for athletics and extracurricular activities, students must have at least <u>an unweighted 2.0 grade point average for the semester</u> and must be in good behavioral and academic standing at CCHS in order to participate in extracurricular activities.







#### WINTER SPORTS UPDATES-

**Swimming-** The swim team has had an exciting year so far! They competed in the National Catholic Swim Meet earlier this month in Baltimore. Lily Patnoe broke the school record in the 100 yard freestyle with a time of 54.75, placing 9th overall. The 200 yard freestyle relay team composed of Hannah Sullivan, Hannah Fisher, Lily Patnoe, and Izzy Paulson also qualified for the National Meet. 
1) CCHS/SHGS will NOT follow ANY of the Kanawha County Schools' weather-related procedures.
